



First Reading



Second Reading


Paul speaks to the Christians in Corinth of the gifts and benefits of the Holy Spirit for believers. What Spirit-driven gifts do you possess?

We Are Never Alone

My children want my help sometimes, and other times, not so much. I remember being a teenager and young adult myself. At times, I thought I knew everything. I didn't need help because I was just so darn smart. Truth is, I needed to find my own way. I needed to stretch my wings and prove to myself and my family I could fly. WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Tithing vs. Stewardship

Question:

What is the difference between tithing and stewardship?

Answer:

Both tithing and stewardship are part of a spiritual way of life that calls us to use all of our resources for the service of the Gospel. Everything we are and everything we have comes from God. Offering back to God what He has given us is part of how we worship and give thanks to God.

Tithing is the practice of giving back 10 percent of what we earn. It comes from the Old English word for "ten." The first Scriptural example of tithing came from Abraham who gave a tenth of his possessions to the priest Melchizedek. He did so as an act of thanksgiving to God.

Stewardship as a way of life calls us to use well all that we have and all that we are, placing all things in service of others and God. Stewardship helps us see the good we can accomplish by making God and our spiritual life the most important values in our life. Whatever we accumulate in this life stays here. We can't take it with us! Both tithing and stewardship help us remember that nothing is mine or even ours ... all belongs to God.

Wash Your Hands


Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds using soap and water. If you can't wash your hands, use hand sanitizer frequently.

DEAR ST. JOHN FISHER FAMILY,

I have asked the two seminarians staying with us during this summer to introduce themselves to you. Seminarian MJ wrote this:

"Hi! My name is Michael James Arianza (o Miguel Santiago), "MJ" for short, and I am from St. Bartholomew Catholic Church in Katy, TX. I've been a seminarian of the Archdiocese of Galveston-Houston for a little over a year now and study at Holy Trinity Seminary in Irving, TX. During the school year, I study Philosophy at the University of Dallas. When I finish in 2022, I will move into my theological studies at St. Mary's Seminary in Houston.

One thing people ask me is "what do seminarians do all day", typically imagining a very monastic lifestyle, praying all day and staving within the confines of the seminary all day long. While I do spend a portion of my day in contemplative prayer, the prayer that makes up the majority of my day is primarily through my work offered up for God, whether that be studying, ministry, exercise, and even recreation. Here at St. John Fisher, I hope to learn much of the life of a diocesan priest from Fr. Jesse and from you, the community of St. John Fisher! Please keep me in your prayers as I pray for you!"

And seminarian Riley wrote this: "My name is Riley O'Sullivan and I just completed my first year as a seminarian. I was born and raised in Cypress, Texas, as the youngest of four. On April 15, 2012, on the Feast of Divine Mercy, me and my family were confirmed into the Catholic Church after converting from Anglicanism. I graduated from Saint John XXIII College Preparatory in 2019 and began seminary studies the following year. I am currently studying at Saint Joseph Seminary College in Covington, Louisiana. I have 8 years to go before I'm ordained a priest. In my spare time, I like to read Tolkien while smoking my pipe as well as play the ukulele. I am very excited to be here at Saint John Fisher to serve "a

family of familias!"

So, on this Pentecost Sunday, let us pray to the Holy Spirit for these young men, that they may grow in holiness and wisdom, especially while they are here with us. And let us also pray to Him who will bring forth many holy vocations to the priesthood in our church.




